#### IV. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Meeting Minutes December 8, 2022 – Brown Jenkins/Martinez M/S/C to approve December Meeting Minutes. All in favor.

#### VI. INTRODUCTION OF NEW MEMBERS

Gattie-Blanco started by introducing herself and invited the board and attendees to introduce themselves.

#### VII. AMENDED ADVISORY BOARD BYLAWS

Gattie-Blanco provided the new members an overview of the changes made to Advisory Board Bylaws which included removal of language in reference to Community Care Licensing requirements, etc.

Brown Jenkins/Reyna M/S/C to approve Advisory Board Bylaws. All in favor.

## VIII. PROGRAM UPDATES

- Accomplishments and Challenges

Streets provided an overview of Homeless Services accomplishments and challenges; overall we are doing well. Our Shelters and Bridge for Youth are the services being asked for the most, and we are constantly full and serving large families with five (5) or more members in the household. We are also being affected by the Emergency Housing Vouchers not being disbursed.

The three (3) HUD Housing projects are consistently full and after a year and a half there was one (1) opening in one of the housing projects due to positive exit into the Housing Choice Voucher program.

Outreach continues to go out every day, Streets would like to expand the outreach team and is seeking funding opportunities.

HOPE housing through the City of Fresno is full as well as Fresno City College housing option they provide. Fresno City College is partnering with RH Builders to open up to San Joaquin which will open an additional 46 units for Fresno City Hope students that qualify. Case managers are overwhelmed with each averaging 40 clients

Pacheco inquired who is in charge of the Hope program, Street confirmed Natalie continues to be at Hope program.

Secundino shared three (3) new apartments have been secured through OVC Housing funding and working on furnishing and stocking the units to move in families. We continue to provide emergency shelter at one (1) apartment funded by Slave 2 Nothing which is currently occupied by two (2) individual households. Additionally, CVAHT participated in Pledge to Stop Trafficking which is a collaborative effort amongst several anti-trafficking agencies in the Central Valley where we raise awareness and funds into a group fund that will be disbursed. CVAHT continues to have challenges with Emergency Housing Vouchers not being disbursed, which is the voucher most often used for clients to attain housing through the coordinated entry system. On-going issue is all six (6) case managers are at capacity and continually seeking additional funding opportunities.

Gattie-Blanco inquired what the amount raised was for Pledge to Stop Trafficking. Secundino shared they raised close to \$7,000 with the new addition of City of Clovis this year. Brown Jenkins gave kudos to the team!

Pacheco inquired how many clients do the case managers serve? Secundino explained that it varies do the needs of each client, and provided scenarios.

Cruz provided an overview to Committee. Art Hop and other events are continuing and have been well attended. ICSI is providing adult mental health groups and averaging 15-20 participants weekly. There is also onsite individual counseling opportunities for clients either at Center or ICSI office.

Community Outreach Educators participated in three (3) Gender and Sexualities Alliance (GSA) clubs at high schools and Fresno City College. Most recently accessed a list of the various GSA clubs and advisors, emails went out to advisors for outreach opportunities to youth. Constantly seeking additional funding.

Tutunjian asked Cruz to elaborate on Art Hop, Cruz shared it's a monthly event which takes place the first Thursday of the month. The LGBTQ Resource Center is an Art Hop



venue, we have queer Fresno artists displaying and selling their art pieces, vendors/artisans selling crafts including resource vendors.

- Program Activity Reports

Activity reports were previously provided to the committee in the Agenda packet.

Gattie-Blanco stated some of the same information from Accomplishment and Challenges are also reflected on these reports which have been updated to a visual info graphic.

Tutunjian inquired if the committee had any comments on the info graphic. Reyna stated it's a clean info graphic, and shared the Excel reports are more in-depth but for each program this would be an easy info graphic. Gattie-Blanco stated to inform us if there's anything else they want incorporated into the info graphic.

Pacheco asked in reference to "capacity" is that dependent on funding vs. capacity at locations. Gattie-Blanco informed the committee it's dependent on the project, when we're talking about capacity and physicality. Transitional Shelter, Bridge Housing and Permanent Housing that has to do with structurally. Pacheco would like to know what is the capacity at the specific location when reviewing the info graphics. Gattie-Blanco provided an example of Transitional Shelter is 16 beds at any given time and served 48 during this time period (January – March). Streets stated for Bridge Housing at N Street capacity is 4 rooms (variety of family sizes) and T Street for Bridge it's 20 beds but that doesn't mean we can't have more than 20 if family size is large. Pacheco stated she would like to have the bed/room capacity would be helpful, Gattie-Blanco she can provide the minimum but it can fluctuate dependent on family size.

- Program Funding Activities

Gattie-Blanco gave a brief overview of the Program Funding Activities.

**IX. FMCOC YOUTH ADVISORY BOARD (YAB)**

We are one (1) out of nearly 50 organizations that participate in Fresno Madera Continuum of Care (FMCoC), Gattie-Blanco serves as the Treasurer and Fresno EOC's representative. As of right now we are one (1) of two (2) youth providers to homeless youth, and are serving as the lead in the formation of youth advisory board. We are looking to develop a Youth Advisory Board and working with consultants from home base who we already work with through FMCoC. The reason for the development is 1) it's needed and 2) ideally the chair of this Youth Advisory Board would also sit on LEAB committee and 3) funding opportunity.

Tutunjian stated reference the approval of Sanctuary Advisory Board Bylaws, section 1b discusses clients serving as part of Sanctuary's Advisory Board, if we're going to be a lead agency for the LEAB Advisory Board she would love to see a seat from Sanctuary's committee to be a part of. It's a great opportunity, Continuum of Cares are already doing this across the nation, lessons learned and a lot of funding opportunities for youth demonstration projects through HUD that we are not eligible for because we haven't formalized a youth advisory board. This is needed and it would be beyond Sanctuary, this is the next step and likes the direction we're going with the youth voice impacting the work for youth.

**X. PROGRAM ANNOUNCEMENTS**

National Safe Place week is March 20 – 24, we are going to host a new site orientation via Zoom, there's currently one (1) organization interested and seeking others. A handout was previously provided to the committee for the new site orientation. On Thursday, March 23rd we are hosting a training for existing partners. We are working closely with National Safe

Place to inspect the partners in regards to quality over quantity and develop a robust training with them. We plan to deliver some treats to our partners and will post in social media pages.

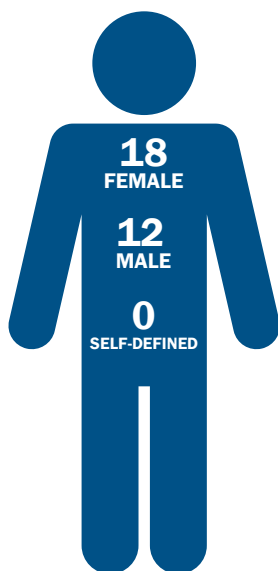
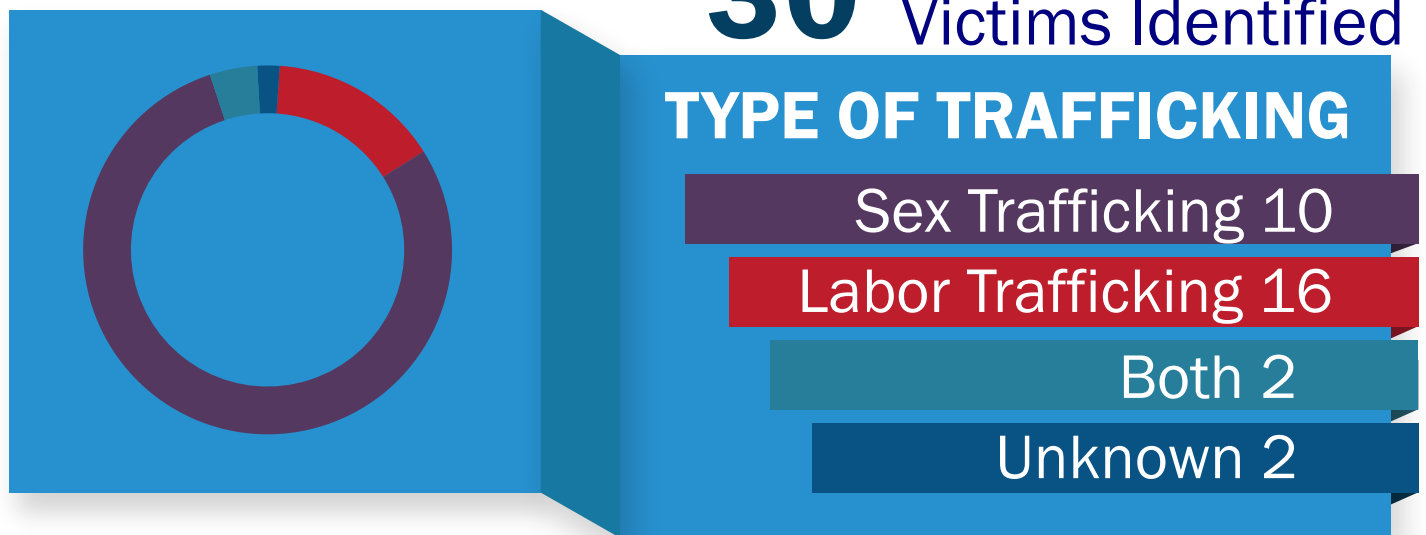
