Central Valley Against Human Trafficking (CVAHT)	 CVAHT's Emergency Shelter Apartment has continued to offer safe temporary shelter. Currently three (3) clients are placed in the apartment. CVAHT has three (3) families placed in the Transitional Apartments funded by OVC, providing housing for a total of 13 individuals. CVAHT staff served a total of 69 clients from January to February, including six (6) new clients. 	 The lack of housing has caused an increased need for emergency shelter. Also, our partners at CVAC are losing VOCA funds in December 2024, causing an increase in our ER shelter needs. All case managers have taken on full caseloads and are at capacity. In search of additional funds to increase personnel capacity in response to the need. 	 January 16th was P2ST and a total of \$5,295.51 was raised. CVAHT sponsored proclamations for January's Human Trafficking Awareness and Prevention Month in the City of Fresno, County of Fresno. City of Reedley, City of Clovis. Additionally, CVAHT attended proclamations in Bakersfield, Madera, and Kerman. Miss Clovis hosted a coat drive on behalf of the program and collected 96 coats for clients. Maurice's of Clovis held a clothing drive on behalf of the program and collected 223 personal articles including undergarments, clothing, blankets and more.
LGBTQ+ Resource Center	 Art Hop continued in September – November bringing 300-400 people to the center to see Q artist's work. January's theme was "New Year, New You" focusing on vision boards and February was "Love Wins" for Valentine's Day. Monthly Paint night is always a success and at capacity this reporting period with 25-25 attendees every month. Peer support groups in the center continue to be well attended. Training conducted for Fresno EOC new hires with approximately 50 attendees. Community Outreach Educators went to six (6) outreach events this reporting period. The program hosted a workshop "Budgeting 101" with Stacy Williams. Program staff attending Fresno American Indian Health Project's "Talking to Spirit" focusing on trans individuals who are American Indian. They also attended the White Root Dig event where the roots of the plant were used to create baskets and baby carriers. 	 Funding to support existing staff is always a challenge. We continue to search for funding to support general operations and the Drop-In Center. ICSI has paused new client counseling sessions due to lack of funding and barriers with medi-cal billing. 	The Center had a visit on January 19 from the California LGBTQ Caucus during their tour of Fresno LGBTQ organizations. In addition to the Senators and Assemblymember in the Caucus, Assemblymember Arambula and Assemblymember Soria joined the visit.


















PARTNER INVESTMENT PIE CHART
