4. CONSENT AGENDA (RATIFY & APPROVE ITEMS) 4_1

APPROVAL OF PULLED CONSENT AGENDA ITEMS

4_1 PROGRAM PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT: FUNDING PROPOSALS FOR AMOUNTS UNDER \$150,000

Ana Medina, Program Planning & Development Director, provided an overview of the funding proposals for grant amounts under \$150,000.

5. ENERGY SERVICES: 2026 LOW INCOME HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (LIHEAP) CONTRACT

Gilda Arreguin, LIHEAP Director, provided an overview of the 2026 LIHEAP contract with the State of California Department of Community Services and Development (CSD) in the amount of \$13,008,542 for a 20-month period. Although the contract has not yet been officially released by CSD, the contract number and county allocations have been provided. We are requesting Committee approval to proceed with submitting the item for full Board approval, ensuring there are no delays in serving the community once the contract is received.

Chair Pacheco requested a brief overview of the program to inform the new commissioner. Arreguin and Latisha Conway, Weatherization Director, explained that the LIHEAP Program provides one-time financial assistance to help Fresno County residents pay energy bills, along with weatherization services designed to make homes safer, more comfortable, and energy efficient. The program's primary goal is to reduce energy costs while improving efficiency and ensuring the health and safety of low-income families. The Commission and staff engaged in further discussion.

Medina informed the commission and staff that the State of California offers a program to assist the community with water bill payments. Additional information is available at ES.calwater.com.

Chair Pacheco inquired about how information regarding these programs is communicated to Head Start 0 to 5 families and inquired if this is an ongoing effort and whether any information is currently being shared with Head Start families about these resources.

Commissioner Alvarado mentioned that during Head Start County-Wide Policy Council meetings, the LIHEAP program is frequently discussed with families. He emphasized that many families rely on this assistance for their energy bill.

Michael Balderas, Head Start 0 to 5 Director, stated that information about LIHEAP and Weatherization is shared with Head Start families through multiple channels. Flyers are uploaded

into the Child Plus database, which stores parents' email addresses, allowing the information to be distributed via email. Additionally, notices are posted on classroom parent boards, and presentations about these programs are occasionally provided during County-Wide Policy Council meetings. Balderas also noted that the team plans to upgrade the Child Plus software to include a mass communication system capable of sending messages via text and phone calls, with implementation expected to begin in January.

6. EVALUATION DEPARTMENT ACTIVITY

Andy Arredondo, Evaluation Director, provided a comprehensive overview of the ongoing activities currently being conducted by the Evaluation Team. These include the Program Evaluation Process and Presentation, Organizational Standards Review and Submission, Operations SharePoint, and CSBG Annual Report.

7. SANCTUARY & SUPPORT – HOMELESS SERVICES PROGRAM EVALUATION

Misty Gattie-Blanco, Sanctuary Director, presented a comprehensive overview of the Sanctuary & Support Services Homeless Services Program, which aims to reduce homelessness in Fresno and Madera County by providing housing assistance and supportive services through partnerships with community organizations and other Fresno EOC departments.

The program is supported by seven contracts; each designed to address homelessness and enhance housing stability for vulnerable populations. These include contracts such as Emergency Shelter, Bridge Housing, and Permanent Housing.

Chair Pacheco inquired for confirmation on which age groups are eligible for the program, as their understanding is that they typically do not serve individuals over age 24. Gattie-Blanco explained that their seven contracts cover various housing initiatives, including outreach, emergency shelter, bridge housing, and permanent housing. The emergency shelter and bridge housing are the only components exclusively serving individuals aged 18 to 24.

Commissioner Lira inquired whether any young adults seek guidance or support regarding transition plans or stability, particularly to help care for their siblings still in the system. Gattie-Blanco responded that while such cases have not occurred recently, they have in the past, and the team remains available to provide follow-up assistance or guidance as needed.

This initiative offers a safe online space, preserves their life stories, and fosters dignity, connection, and joy. Program sponsorship plants hope, preserves wisdom, and creates a lasting legacy of happiness.

Recommended Action

The information presented below is intended to keep the Board apprised on the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Continuum of Care (CoC) program funding applications.

Background

The CoC program is designed to promote a community-wide commitment to the goal of ending homelessness; provide funding for efforts by nonprofit providers, States, Indian Tribes or Tribally Designated Housing Entities, and local governments to quickly re-house homeless individuals, families, persons fleeing domestic violence, and youth while minimizing the trauma and dislocation caused by homelessness; promote access to and effective utilization of mainstream programs and programs funded with State or local resources; and optimize self-sufficiency among individuals and families experiencing homelessness.

The FY 2025 CoC Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) was released on November 20, 2025, opening the competition and making approximately \$3.9 billion available to serve homeless people nationally. This NOFA combined several individual funding opportunities including CoC Builds and Youth Homelessness Demonstration Program. Applications are reviewed by the CoC’s consultant and are locally reviewed and ranked by a panel prior to submission to HUD, ensuring alignment with local priorities and processes and preparing the consolidated application for submission before January 12, 2026 (two days ahead of HUD’s deadline of January 14).

The CoC’s estimated Annual Renewal Demand is \$13,393,862 in funding to support existing housing and services for homeless households; \$3,351,515 in CoC Bonus funds; \$1,675,758 for Domestic Violence Bonus funds; and \$837,879 for CoC Planning. As in previous years, there is a requirement to rank all project applications into two tiers. This year, the Tier 1 maximum has been drastically decreased to 30% of the total Annual Renewal Demand and only 30% can be Permanent Supportive Housing. Transitional Housing is now an eligible activity in this new funding opportunity. The Fresno Madera Continuum of Care (FMCoC) aligned its priorities with HUD and reduced permanent housing from \$9.9 million to \$4 million.

The local Review and Rank Panel will review and discuss proposals on December 22, 2025. The list of projects will be distributed between December 23-30, and the FMCoC will vote on the Priority

Listing during that time. Projects approved in Tier 1 and Tier 2 will finalize their eSNAPS applications and submit them on January 5.

Fresno EOC currently operates four (4) HUD CoC funded projects: Project Phoenix, Project Hearth, Project Rise and HERO Team 2 to align with the agency's mission of housing stability and was awarded one new housing project, Project Home in FY2024. After the local prioritization, Fresno EOC will reallocate the first-year contract, Project Home (\$542,405) and \$258,203 (15% of total funding) between the three remaining housing projects.

Due to the complexities of the application process involving both a local and federal review, a staff report recommending approval to submit grant applications will be presented at the Program Planning and Evaluation Committee meeting in January 2026, following the approval of the final priority listing.

Fiscal Impact

The three (3) renewal housing projects' current total funding is \$1,462,895. The renewal coordinated entry project is \$558,816. Each project requires a 25% match.

Recommended Action

Chief Executive Officer recommends Committee ratification for full Board consideration of the State of California, Department of Community Services and Development (CSD), Department of Energy (DOE) Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP) Agreement Number 22P-7007, Amendment 2. This amendment increases the agreement amount by \$1,268,993, from \$6,033,262 to \$7,302,255 and extends the contract term from June 1, 2023, through June 30, 2029.

Background

The DOE IIJA (formerly DOE Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) contract was approved by the Board of Commissioners at the August 30, 2023, meeting, Agenda item 8A8.

It is projected that approximately 569 homes in Fresno County will receive weatherization services over the term of this agreement. These services provide no-cost energy efficiency improvements to eligible low-income households, reducing monthly utility expenses while improving occupant health and safety. To date, 157 homes have been successfully weatherized under this contract.

Fiscal Impact

This funding will cover existing personnel, operational, and direct service costs. The funds will be distributed in three phases as outlined in the attached Local Service Provider Allocation Spreadsheet.

Chief Executive Officer recommends Committee ratification for full Board consideration of the Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2024/25 Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5310 grant application to the Fresno Council of Governments (Fresno COG) in the amount of \$750,000 to fund 80% of the cost of three electric cutaway vehicles.

Background

The program aims to improve mobility for seniors and individuals with disabilities by removing barriers to transportation service and expanding transportation options. Transit Systems has been meeting the transportation needs of older adults and people with disabilities in partnership with the Central Valley Regional Center, Fresno County Rural Transit Authority, and City of Fresno FAX since 1983.

The Governor of California has designated the Fresno COG as the Designated Recipient in Fresno County of Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5310 grants for the purpose of administering those funds in accordance with state and federal laws, statutes, and regulations.

These three 16-passenger cutaway buses will represent the first electric vehicles in Transit Systems' fleet.

The grant application was submitted on November 21, 2025.

Fiscal Impact

The cost per electric cutaway vehicle is \$310,000. The agency will secure an outstanding 20% (\$186,000) for the three units using surplus funds or other grant funding.

The replacement of three aging buses with electric cutaway vehicles is expected to reduce fuel consumption by approximately \$69,287 per year for all three vehicles.
