APPROVAL OF PULLED CONSENT AGENDA ITEMS

4_2 SANCTUARY AND SUPPORT SERVICES: FY 2025 CONTINUUM OF CARE COMPETITION

Misty Gattie-Blanco, Sanctuary Director, provided an update of the HUD Continuum of Care (CoC) funding process. Due to new guidelines in the recent Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO), only 30% of their annual renewal demand can be placed in tier one, a significant reduction from previous years' allocations. Additionally, no more than 30% of funds can be allocated to permanent supportive housing, favoring transitional housing instead. Their local review process resulted in all three existing renewal projects fitting into the new tier one limit, though they had to reduce funding by approximately \$258,203, which was distributed among the projects.

Gattie-Blanco explained that Project Home, which was awarded funding this year but is not yet under contract, was not included in the 30% tier one allocation; however, the funds may be reallocated in the future. Gattie-Blanco stated that, due to ongoing lawsuits challenging recent changes such as the reduction of the award period from two years to 12 months, the NOFO has been withdrawn. Consequently, many local continuums have paused the funding process until further guidance is provided. The Sanctuary housing programs will continue to operate as they are until August of 2026, with potentially minor changes.

5. ENERGY SERVICES: 2022 WEATHERIZATION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (WAP) AGREEMENT – AMENDMENT 2

Latisha Conway, Weatherization Director, provided an overview of the 2022 Weatherization Assistance Program Amendment 2 with the State of California, Department of Community Services and Development (CSD), Department of Energy (DOE). The amendment increases the contract amount by \$1,268,993, raising it from \$6,033,262 to \$7,302,255, and extends the contract duration from June 1, 2023, to June 30, 2029. These funds are projected to support approximately 569 homes in Fresno County to receive weatherization services.

Chair Pacheco inquired about the average number of homes being weatherized. Conway stated that, on average, approximately 300 homes are weatherized a year.

Commissioner Alvarado inquired whether renters will also be able to access these services, or if they are exclusively available to homeowners. Conway stated that renters can apply for the services with the owner's permission.

Commissioner Alvarado stated concerns about what options are available if a renter attempts to access the services, but the homeowner is uncooperative and refuses to provide the necessary permission. Conway clarified that the program cannot access a home without the owner's consent. To help overcome this obstacle, they offer multiple options such as faxing documents, visiting the homeowner, or emailing, to make the process as convenient as possible. Sherry Neil, Programs Officer, added that, unfortunately, Fresno EOC Energy Services cannot enter rental properties for repairs without landlord approval. Neil also shared that, back East, tenants have successfully filed Rent Escrow cases through the courts to compel landlords to make necessary repairs, and will look into the services available here in Fresno County to help families in similar situations.

6. **TRANSIT SYSTEMS: FEDERAL TRANSIT ADMINISTRATION (FTA) SECTION 5310 PROGRAM - GRANT APPLICATION**

Patrick Turner, Training and Employment Director/Interim Transit Systems Director, provided an overview of the Federal Transit Administration Section 5310 grant application submitted to the Fresno Council of Governments, in the amount of \$750,000 to cover 80% of the cost for three electric cutaway vehicles. If funded, this aims to enhance mobility for seniors and individuals with disabilities by eliminating transportation barriers and expanding transportation options.

Commissioner Lira inquired about the mileage or hours of operation per charge for the vehicles. Turner explained that most vehicles currently have a range of approximately 100 to 110 miles, though realistically, they can typically operate around 80 to 90 miles per day. Since most inner-city routes are only between 57 and 72 miles, these vehicles should be adequate for those areas. However, with current technology, they are not suitable for rural locations.

Commissioner Lira inquired about the charging locations for these vehicles. Turner responded that the Fresno EOC Nielsen Center is rapidly transforming, with plans to electrify the yard and install solar-powered charging stations on-site.

Commissioner Alvarado inquired whether the new buses would serve the entire EOC organization. Turner stated currently, the buses will serve only clients who are seniors or have special needs, as specified by the grant. Fresno EOC plans to transition most Head Start buses to electric in the future.

7. **EVALUATION DEPARTMENT ACTIVITY**

Andy Arredondo, Evaluation Director, provided a comprehensive overview of the ongoing activities currently being conducted by the Evaluation Team. These include the Program Evaluation Process and Presentation, Organizational Standards Review and Submission, Operations SharePoint, CSBG Annual Report, and Strategic Plan.

Public Comments: None heard.

8. PROGRAM EVALUATION

A. Sanctuary & Support – CVAHT and LGBTQ+ Resource Center

Gattie-Blanco, presented a comprehensive overview of the Sanctuary & Support Services Central Valley Against Human Trafficking (CVAHT) and the LGBTQ+ Resource Center programs, highlighting their efforts to support vulnerable communities in Fresno County and address community needs like housing, health services, and safety.

CVAHT supports human trafficking victims through case management, housing, meals, advocacy, and crisis intervention, serving 203 participants annually with \$1.2M funding and 7 staff. Despite budget cuts in 2025, the program continues to provide critical services.

Commissioner Alvarado expressed concern about the work status chart, noting that 85 participants are listed as unspecified and 55 as unemployed, and questioned what resources or initiatives are available to assist them in gaining employment or education. Gattie-Blanco explained that the 85 participants labeled as unspecified may be employed but chose not to disclose their status. For the 55 unemployed and others, the organization has partnerships with various training and employment programs. They also assist clients in obtaining citizenship when needed, as this affects job eligibility.

Commissioner Alvarado suggested that it would be helpful to know how many people are unemployed due to legal issues, so they can be directed to services like Central La Familia Advocacy Services or other advocacy agencies that assist with paperwork, citizenship, and legal status, to better support their entry into the workforce.

Arredondo explained that higher numbers of unspecified data in categories like CVAHT and LGBTQ+ are due to issues of trust and the sensitive nature of trafficking, where individuals' histories may be erased. Building trust and awareness takes time, which contributes to these higher, unspecified figures.

LGBTQ+ Resource Center offers advocacy, safe spaces, case management, peer support, and training for organizations. It has supported 302 participants annually with \$272K funding and 3 staff. The center created the Trans Medical Need Fund (TMNF), raising \$82K to assist 260 transgender individuals. However, it faces closure on December 27, 2025, due to funding challenges.

Commissioner Alvarado asked if the program would continue to operate in some capacity, such as connecting people to resources, if funding is lost. Gattie-Blanco responded that although the dedicated space for LGBTQ+ individuals will be closing, services will continue through existing programs such as the health team, homeless services, and partnerships with organizations like Casita Feliz and the Fresno Inclusive and Queer Collective, which have physical locations.

Arredondo emphasized the importance of advocating for these programs, which face funding attacks and are increasingly threatened. Despite the challenges, the work being done is vital, and ongoing support is essential.

Chair Pacheco emphasized the importance of personal connections to combat fear and political divisiveness and urged everyone to get to know people as individuals to reduce public political fear and expressed interest in following up to discuss how to better support these initiatives, and emphasized the importance of also supporting the well-being of their team.

Medina explained that in December, the team focuses on reviewing submitted grants, following up on existing applications, and conducting in-depth research to diversify funding sources and connect with new foundations. They are also planning how to approach potential funders. Additionally, they are collaborating closely with the energy services, weatherization, and workforce connection teams to develop a weatherization training program. They are preparing for discussions with the Economic Development Administration to ensure funders fully understand the program when it's ready to be presented.

Recommended Action

The information presented below is intended to keep the Board apprised of the change in Employer of Record under the Housing and Homelessness Incentive Program (HHIP).

Background


This item was approved by the Board of Commissioners at the May 19, 2025, Consent Agenda item 7_3 to enter into three contract agreements with CalViva/Health Net, Anthem Blue Cross, and Kaiser Permanente in the amount of \$305,498 over a 24-month project period from July 1, 2025, to June 30, 2027.

HHIP is an incentive program that aims to improve health outcomes and access to whole care services by addressing housing insecurity and instability as a social determinant of health for Medi-Cal members. The goals of the program are to:

1. Reduce and prevent homelessness; and,
2. Ensure that Medi-Cal Managed Care Plans (MCPs) develop the necessary capacity and partnerships to connect their members to needed housing services.

As a long-standing member of the Fresno Madera Continuum of Care (FMCoC) and primary youth serving provider, Fresno EOC was authorized to use funds to support one Lived Experience Liaison, whose role is to collaborate closely with Lived Experience experts and facilitate the development and ongoing support of a Youth Action Board. Funds were also allocated to provide direct financial support to both experts and youth through stipends.

Following the program award, discussions with the MCPs led to a consensus that it would be more beneficial for the FMCoC if the Lived Experience Liaison position were employed by RH Community Builders given that they also have funding from the MCP's for two FMCoC positions. As a result, Fresno EOC will enter into an Operational Agreement with RH Community Builders, retroactively effective from October 1, 2025, through June 30, 2027, for an amount not to exceed \$200,000. RH Community Builders will submit monthly invoices with the required documentation for reimbursement. Fresno EOC will retain the primary contract and continue to directly administer stipends to Lived Experience experts and youth, ensuring oversight and continuity in contract



administration. Meanwhile, RH Community Builders will become the employer of record for the transferred staff member.

Fiscal Impact

Funds will continue to support the Lived Experience Liaison role and related staffing expenses, such as cell phone stipends and mileage reimbursements.

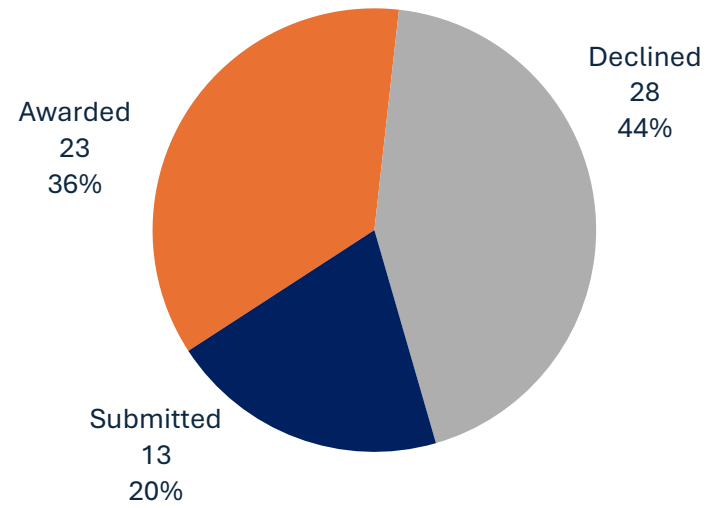

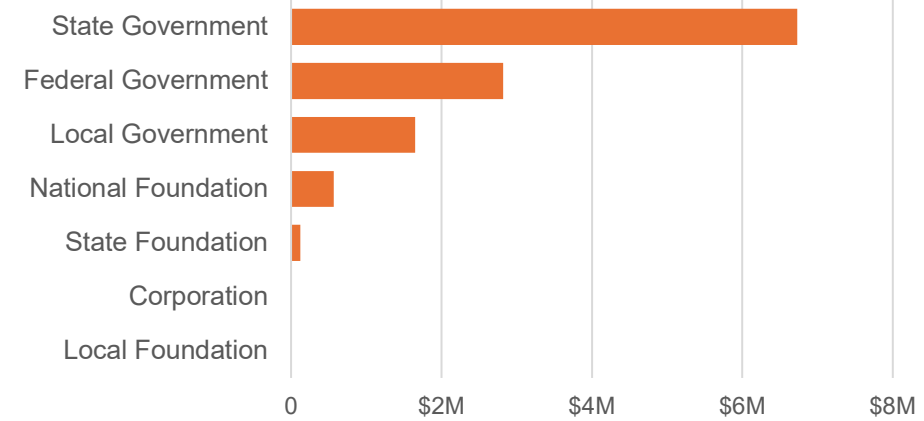

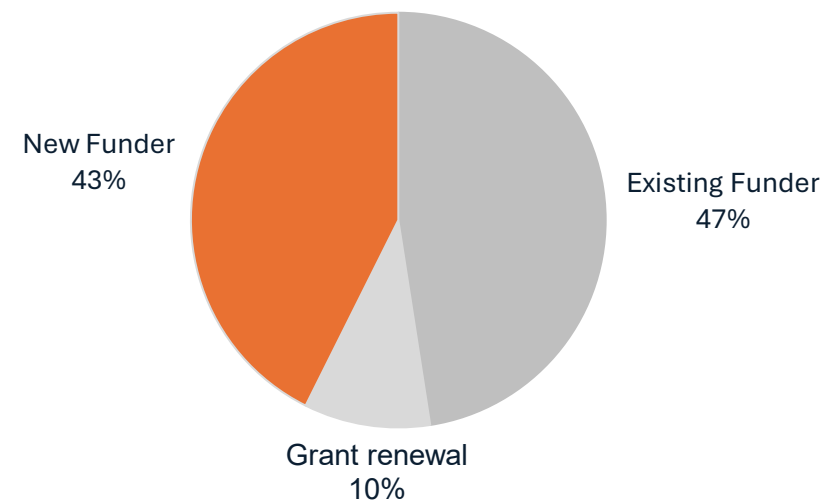
Grants by Status



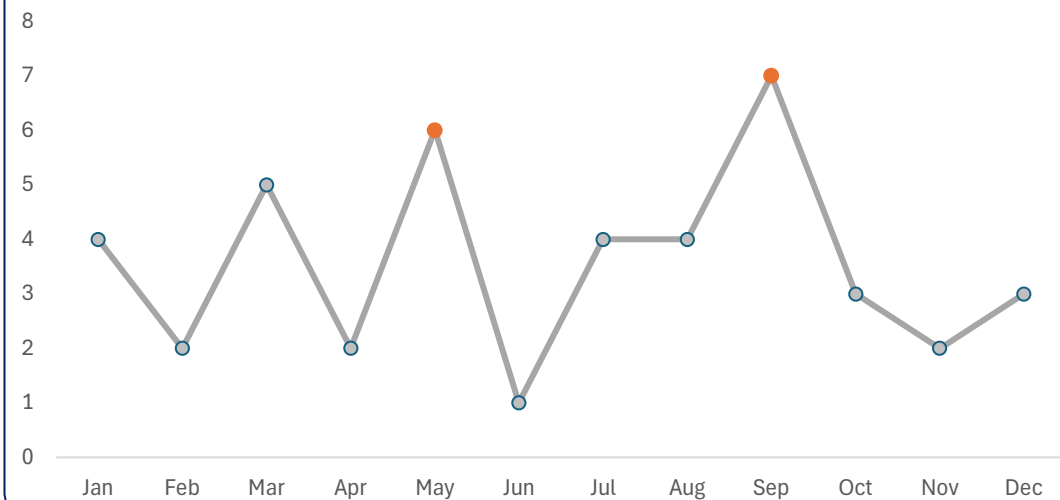
Amount Awarded by Type of Funder
